Pom Pom Rug

Pom-Poms are everywhere! This cushy pom-pom rug will look great in a baby or child's room. Make one in these fun colors or choose your own.

Finished Measurements:

About 23 x 31 in. (58.5 x 79 cm)

Supplies:

- 4 Balls (Color A) – Lion Brand Vanna's Choice, Aqua (or your choice of color)
 - 4 Balls (Color B) – Lion Brand Vanna's Choice, Scarlet (or your choice of color)
 - 4 Balls (Color C) – Lion Brand Vanna's Choice, Terracotta (or your choice of color)
 - 3 Balls (Color D) – Lion Brand Vanna's Choice, Eggplant (or your choice of color)
 - 3 Balls (Color E) – Lion Brand Vanna's Choice, Mustard (or your choice of color)
 - 3 Balls (Color F) – Lion Brand Vanna's Choice, Fern (or your choice of color)
 - Large Pom-Pom Maker
 - Yarn Needle
- Additional Materials:
- 23 x 31 in. (58.5 x 79 cm) piece of rug canvas or burlap



IMPORTANT SAFETY NOTES

The strands of yarn in the Pom-Pom Rug can present a **choking hazard for children under the age of 3 years.**

Children under 3 years old should not play with or be left unsupervised with the Pom-Pom Rug.

If used on a bare floor, the Pom-Pom Rug is not stable and can slip. **We suggest using a non-slip pad under the Rug..**

Rug Instructions

Following package directions and leaving long tails on each pom-pom, make large pom-poms as follows: 26 with A, 26 with B, 22 with C, 20 with D, 21 with E, and 15 with F.

Finishing

With A, work closely-spaced blanket stitch around outside edge of rug canvas.

Using yarn tails for sewing and placing colors as desired, sew 10 rows of 13 pom-poms each onto canvas. Weave in ends.

Tip:

After you complete a pom pom, shake it vigorously to fluff the yarn, and trim any uneven ends.

How to make a pom pom without a pom pom maker

If the Pom Pom maker is out of stock, please follow these directions to make your Pom Poms.

To make a large pom pom, cut a cardboard template approximately 4" by 6", and cut a short slit in one end. Cut a 10" piece of yarn and lay it across the cardboard, securing the end in the slit in the cardboard. **(Fig. 91)**

Wrap the yarn around the cardboard approximately 50 times. The more times you wrap the yarn, the fatter the pom pom will be so you may have to adjust the number of wraps you make to suit your project. **(Fig. 92)**

Use the 10" length of yarn to tie a strong knot around the wrapped yarn near the top of the card, then cut through wrapped yarn at the bottom of the card. **(Fig. 93)**

Remove the yarn from the card and fluff it up to form the pom pom. Trim any uneven yarn ends to create a round pom pom. Use the long ends of the tie to secure your pom pom to the project.

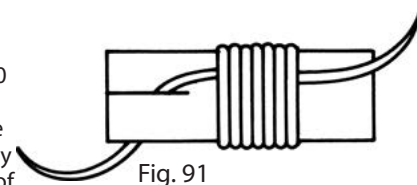
